The Rapidly Emerging Antiviral Drug Development Initiative (READDI) is working to give humanity an early advantage against future diseases. READDI has the specific objective of making medicines that will prevent the next pandemic.

11:30 a.m. Research Addressing Violence in Education (RAVE) Lab: Empirically Based Innovative Prevention and Intervention Efforts to Address Bullying and School Violence

UNC William C. Friday Distinguish Professor of Education Dorothy Espelage has conducted research on youth violence for 25 years, including numerous longitudinal studies and randomized clinical trials across early and late adolescence. This translational research presentation will include a discussion on youth bullying, including face-to-face bullying, cyberbullying, gender-based bullying and sexual harassment, and teen dating violence among middle and high school students. Prevalence, definitions, and underlying risks and protective factors (e.g., individual, family, school, peers) associated with these behaviors will be presented. School-based interventions will be discussed, including social-emotional learning approaches, bystander interventions, and programs that address bias-based bullying.

Vice Chancellor Michael (Mike) Andreasen



Michael Andreasen is the University's senior development officer and oversees the Office of University Development staff, which works closely with campus fundraising offices and affiliated foundations that support schools, the College of Arts and Sciences and other units. Andreasen also is chief executive of the UNC-Chapel Hill Foundation Inc., a nonprofit corporation that receives gifts on behalf of the University, its schools, and units.

Prior to joining Carolina in 2023, Andreasen served as senior vice president for university advancement at the University of Oregon, overseeing all aspects of advancement including

development; state, community, and federal affairs; advancement operations; stewardship and public events and alumni relations. During his tenure, he consistently increased annual fundraising totals and secured some of the largest donations to any public flagship university.

Andreasen began his time at UO as the vice president for development, leading efforts to establish campaign priorities, setting a working goal of \$1.2 billion and developing a communications plan for the public launch in collaboration with the president, executive leadership, and deans. Over 12 years, he served as a member of the University of Oregon Foundation Board, the Alumni Association Board, the Portland Business Alliance Board and the Greater Portland Chamber of Commerce.

Prior to joining UO, Andreasen was at the University of Michigan for seven years — first as executive director and assistant dean for advancement for development and alumni relations and then as executive director and assistant dean for advancement at the Stephen M. Ross School of Business. His more than 32 years of fundraising experience include roles in major gifts and campaign leadership at the University of California, Santa Barbara, and the American Film Institute. He began his career as the director of the annual fund for the University of California, Irvine, where he also earned a Bachelor of Arts in political science.

Trustee Chair David Boliek



David Boliek is an attorney and partner with Williford, Crenshaw, Boliek and Frangakis LLP in Fayetteville. His practice focuses on litigation and consults on healthcare issues, specifically those in the allied health field. Previously, he spent several years as an award-winning journalist, political consultant and public relations professional. Boliek also previously served as CEO of a government contracting firm and as a prosecutor in Cumberland County. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in journalism from UNC-Chapel Hill and J.D. with honors and MBA from Campbell University. His community leadership roles have included serving on the UNC-Chapel Hill Board of Visitors, Boy Scouts of America and youth sports. He currently serves as

chair of the Southeast Regional Area Health Education Center and as an elder at Highland Presbyterian Church in Fayetteville.

Chancellor Kevin Guskiewicz, Ph.D.



Kevin M. Guskiewicz, a neuroscientist, academic leader and concussion researcher, is the 12th chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

As chancellor, Guskiewicz has led the implementation of Carolina's new strategic plan, Carolina Next: Innovations for Public Good. He leads Carolina's \$1.2 billion research enterprise, the nation's 13th largest research university in total research expenditures. He has launched several initiatives, including Carolina Across 100, the Institute for Convergent Science, the History, Race and a Way Forward Commission, and the Rapidly Emerging Antiviral Drug Development Initiative. He led the university community through

the COVID-19 pandemic, including the transition to remote learning in March 2020.

Prior to his appointment as chancellor, Guskiewicz served as dean of the College of Arts & Sciences. A Kenan Distinguished Professor of Exercise and Sport Science, he has been a member of Carolina's faculty since 1995. He is co-director of the Matthew Gfeller Sport-Related Traumatic Brain Injury Research Center and serves as the director for the Center for the Study of Retired Athletes. A nationally recognized expert on sport-related concussions, his work has influenced concussion guidelines in the NFL, NCAA and National Federation of State High School Associations. In 2011, Guskiewicz received the prestigious MacArthur Fellowship and in 2013, Time magazine named him a Game Changer, one of 18 "innovators and problem-solvers that are inspiring change in America."

Guskiewicz earned his Ph.D. in sports medicine from the University of Virginia. He lives with his wife Amy and children Jacob, Nathan, Adam, and Tessa in Chapel Hill.

Mr. Bernard Bell, MBA



Bernard Bell became executive director of the UNC Shuford Program in Entrepreneurship in 2017 after serving as an Entrepreneur in Residence and as Chairman and CEO of Urban Media Solutions, which he created following 23 years in the television industry. In the Shuford Program, Bell oversees, manages and grows the teaching, venture development and overall entrepreneurial efforts within the College of Arts and Sciences. Under his leadership, the program has gone from ranked #12 to #4. nationally. Bell received a B.S. in economics from UNC in 1982 and an MBA from UNC's Kenan-Flagler Business School in 1992.

Lianne Cartee is a Teaching Professor and Director of the Undergraduate Program in the Joint Department of Biomedical Engineering at the University of North Carolina and North Carolina State University. The joint undergraduate program is a unique program

where approximately 500 students have full student status at two major research universities. Lianne's work to develop the Joint Program and the concept of the 3D engineer have been nominated for the National Academy of Engineers' Gordan Prize for innovation in Engineering Education. She is a member of the NC State Academy of Outstanding Teachers and has received numerous awards for outstanding teaching and

mentoring.

Dr. Gerald Cohen, Ph.D.



Gerald D. Cohen is Chief Economist of the Kenan Institute of Private Enterprise where he provides strategic vision and leadership of the translational economic research and policy initiatives at the Institute. He is also a Research Professor at The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill's Kenan-Flagler Business School, where he teaches the highly regarded 'Persuasion with Data' class.

He has worked in both the public and private sectors focusing on the intersection between financial markets and economic fundamentals. During the Obama Administration Cohen

was Deputy Assistant Secretary for Macroeconomic Analysis at the U.S. Department of Treasury where he helped formulate and evaluate the impact of policy proposals on the U.S. economy. Prior to Treasury, he co-managed a global macro fund at Ziff Brothers Investments.

Cohen holds a B.S. from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a Ph.D. in Economics from Harvard University and is a contributing author to *30-Second Money* as well as a co-author of *Political Cycles and the Macroeconomy*.

Dr. Dorothy L. Espelage, Ph.D.



Dorothy L. Espelage, Ph.D., is William C. Friday, Distinguished Professor of Education at UNC. She is the recipient of the APA Lifetime Achievement Award in Prevention Science and the 2016 APA Award for Distinguished Contributions to Research in Public Policy, and is a Fellow of APS, APA, and AERA. She is an elected member of the National Academy of Education, awarded the SPR Prevention Science Award in 2020, and received a lifetime mentoring award from the National Partnership to End Interpersonal Violence. She earned her Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology from Indiana

University in 1997. Over the past 25 years, she has authored more than 275 peer- reviewed articles, eight edited books, and 80 chapters on bullying, homophobic teasing, sexual harassment, dating violence, social-emotional learning interventions, and adolescent suicide. Her research focuses on translating empirical findings into prevention and intervention programming and she has secured over 20 million dollars of external funding. She advises members of Congress and Senate on bully prevention legislation. She conducts regular webinars for CDC, NIH, and NIJ to disseminate research.

Dr. Espelage has conducted randomized clinical trials to evaluate K-12 social-emotional learning programs to reduce youth aggression, peer-led interventions to address sexual violence and suicidal behaviors, and virtual reality-based bully prevention programs. Findings of her research are guiding state, national, and international efforts to prevent youth violence and promote positive school climates. She authored a 2011 White House Brief on bullying among LGBTQ youth and attended the White House Conference in 2011 and has been a consultant on the stopbullying.gov website and consultant to the National Anti-bullying Campaign, *Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA)* in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). She has presented multiple times at the Federal Partnership to End Bullying Summit and Conference. She is a consultant to the National Institutes of Health Pathways to Prevention Initiative to address bullying and youth suicide. Dr. Espelage has appeared on many television news and talk shows, including *The Today Show; CNN; CBS Evening News; The Oprah Winfrey Show, Anderson, Anderson 360* and has been quoted in the national print press, including *Time Magazine, USA Today, People, Boston Globe,* and the *Wall Street Journal*.

Mr. Cortland Gilliam



Cortland Gilliam is a poet, educator, cultural organizer, and doctoral candidate in Education at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. In his academic work, he studies cultures of school discipline, political education, and histories of Black youth contributions to political struggles and liberation movements of the late twentieth century. His creative work explores and illuminates the hues and textures of racialized experiences, identities, and histories. In addition to being Chapel Hill's newest poet laureate, he presently serves as Co-Chair of the Board of Directors for the Marian Cheek lackson Center. Cultural space-making and space-taking are essential to his artistic and

political practice and the ways he aims to cultivate community.

Dr. Shawn D. Hingtgen, Ph.D.



Shawn Hingtgen is a translational scientist specializing in cancer therapy. Dr. Hingtgen began his scientific career earning his BS from the University of Iowa. He then began his doctoral studies working in gene therapy for heart failure and received his PhD in Anatomy and Cell Biology from the University of Iowa. He moved to Massachusetts General Hospital/Harvard Medical School where he completed his postdoctoral fellow and became an Instructor in the Department of Radiology at Massachusetts General Hospital/Harvard Medical School. He then moved to UNC Chapel Hill as an assistant professor in the UNC Eshelman School of Pharmacy in the spring of 2012. Dr. Hingtgen's work focuses on blending biology, engineering, neuroscience, and drug delivery to create novel therapies for cancer. He's

passionate about helping human patients and has built a translational team bringing treatments out of the research setting into human trials. He is also the co-founder of one company, inventor on several patents, and brings an entrepreneurial mindset to his academic work.

Dr. Nancy Messonnier, MD



Nancy Messonnier, MD, is dean of the UNC Gillings School of Global Public Health and Bryson Distinguished Professor in Public Health. Dean Messonnier has more than 25 years of experience as a public health leader, having served in influential roles at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), including director of the National Center for Immunization and Respiratory Diseases (NCIRD) from 2014-2021. She was executive director for Pandemic Prevention and Health Systems at the Skoll Foundation before becoming dean of the Gillings School in fall 2022. Dr. Messonnier has focused on developing and implementing accessible vaccines globally, promoting vaccine confidence, addressing disparities in immunization coverage, and preventing future

pandemics. She led the NCIRD's response to COVID-19 and served as the CDC's chief architect of the COVID-19 vaccine implementation program, helping to develop, evaluate and distribute vaccines across the United States. She was inducted into the National Academy of Medicine in 2021. She received her bachelor's degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Doctor of Medicine degree from the University of Chicago School of Medicine and completed her internal medicine residency training at the University of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Nathaniel (Nat) Moorman, Ph.D.



Nat Moorman is a co-founder of READDI, and an associate professor in the Department of Microbiology & Immunology in the UNC School of Medicine. His research focuses on understanding how viruses replicate at the molecular level and using that information to develop new antiviral drugs. Dr. Moorman holds a Bachelor of Science in Microbiology from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign and a PhD in Molecular Microbiology & Microbial Pathogenesis from Washington University in St. Louis. He completed his postdoctoral training at Princeton University before joining the UNC faculty in 2010.

Mr. James (Jimmy) Rosen, MBA



James "Jimmy" Rosen was named CEO of the Rapidly Emerging Antiviral Drug Development Initiative (READDI) in September. He has 35 years of research, finance and operational experience across the health care and life sciences sectors. His experiences have taken him to the National Cancer Institute, Wall Street, and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. During the five years before READDI. Rosen worked on the operating side as CEO of Artizan Biosciences, a biotech spinout from Yale University.

Trustee Ramsey White



Ramsey White is a graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill with a degree in Journalism and Mass Communication. White worked in the development departments at the Morehead-Cain Foundation and at the University of North Carolina. She is now an active volunteer focused specifically on children's causes, both with her children's schools and her community broadly. She has co-chaired the chief fundraising event at Landon School, Durham Academy and University Presbyterian Preschool, two times each in the last decade. Currently, she is an active volunteer at Landon School and Holton-Arms School in various roles.

Additionally, she and her children served as an Area Coordinator with the inaugural chapter of Familes4Families, pairing local volunteer families with carefully vetted nonprofit partners to deliver groceries and other essential items monthly to families. She and her husband, also a graduate of the University, live in Washington, DC with their two children.
